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What is an Administrator-In-Training (AIT) Program?

- The AIT program is a personalized training designed to prepare the applicant for the rigors of running a Skilled Nursing Facility (SNF).
- The AIT program is developed and supervised by the Preceptor (PRE).
- The AIT Program should expose the AIT to all aspects of the facility.



What is a Preceptor (PRE)?

Preceptors are Nursing Home Administrators (NHA) who are charged and entrusted with coaching, mentoring and guiding their Administrator-In-Training (AIT) through the AIT program, as well as providing support after the AIT receives his or her initial license.




Who can be a Preceptor?

Health and Safety Code Section 1416.57(b):

- Active NHA License
- Have no pending disciplinary actions
- Served at least 2 years as designated NHA of a facility
- Has gained experience in all administrative function of a nursing home

Health and Safety Code Section 1416.57(d):


- ... the facilities at which the applicant has had direct management control as an administrator had a continuous operating history, free from major deficiencies, during the period of the applicant's administration.



Preceptor Duties AIT Applications

- Assess the applicant (National Association of Long-term Care Boards [NAB] has a good Assessment tool as a starting point)
- Develop personalized Training outline based on Assessment
 - Outlines must at a minimum cover the 19 topics in HSC 1416.55 (but can cover more)
 - Minimum of 1,000 hour program (but can be more based on assessment of applicant)
- Fill out the Preceptor portion of CDPH 502.

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AIT Education and Experience Requirements

Per HSC 1416.55, AIT applicants shall meet one of the following pathways to be eligible for the AIT program:

1. A doctorate degree in medicine and a current valid license as a physician and surgeon.
2. A baccalaureate degree.
3. Ten years of full-time work experience and a current valid license as a registered nurse. At least the most recent five years of the 10 years of work experience shall be in a supervisory or director of nursing position.
4. Ten years of full-time work experience in any department of a skilled nursing facility, an intermediate care facility, or an intermediate care facility/developmentally disabled with at least 60 semester units (or 90 quarter units) of college or university courses. At least the most recent five years of the 10 years of work experience shall be in a position as a department manager.
5. Ten years of full-time hospital administration experience in an acute care hospital with at least 60 semester units (or 90 quarter units) of college or university courses. At least the most recent five years of the 10 years of work experience shall be in a supervisory position.

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AIT Requirements HSC 1416.55

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Preceptor Duties During AIT Program

Health and Safety Code Section 1416.57(f):

- Provides directly-supervised training at NHAP approved facility. For AIT hours to count, the Preceptor is committing to be physically present and available during the training*.
*(min: 20 hours/week – max: 60 hours/week)
- Supervises no more than two AITs at a time.
- Has regular personal contact with the AIT when not at the facility.
- Informs NHAP of changes to the AIT Program.
- Rates AIT's performance and completes AIT Evaluation Report.

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Changes in the AIT Program

If you make any of the changes below,

- Change AIT training hours by more than 10 hours per week?
- Move AIT training to another facility?
- Changing of preceptors?

Complete section 11 on page 4 of CDPH 502 form and new training outline*. Be sure to include:

- Number of hours per week you, as the preceptor, will be personally onsite supervising the training (min 20, max 60).
- Name of training facility.

Fill out and sign preceptor information.

*Please include a narrative as to why the changes are being made.
 Changes do not take effect until approved by NHAP

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Preceptor Requirements HSC 1416.57

- AIT Evaluation (CDPH 501)
- Quarterly evaluations (250 training hours) must be submitted within 30 days of completion.
 - Final evaluations within 10 days of completion.
 - Submit pages 4-7 of the CDPH 501 when submitting 4th Quarter evaluation.
 - Please make sure the evaluations are completely filled out including the hours and dates.
- We can accept the signed evaluations via email/fax.
- AIT is not eligible to take the exams until the NHAP has processed and approved the final evaluation.

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Annual Fee Report

- Exam and license information is posted yearly in the Annual Fee report

- Number of exam attempts - 1466

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Failure to Pass State or National Exam



- An applicant who does not pass their initial exam can retake the exam two additional times.
- New exam applications and fees are required for each attempt.
- An applicant who does not pass the exam three times is required to complete additional training before attempting the exam a fourth time.
- The AIT can reapply to take the exam once the additional training hours are complete.

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AIT Program Do and Don't

- Do - report any issues or deviations from the original planned outline to NHAP.

Not reporting can lead to the hours being invalidated and the AIT having to redo the hours, or the program being denied altogether.

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AIT Program Do and Don't

- Don't – Leave AIT's alone during Training hours.

Preceptors are still personally accountable for their facilities and what happens in them. Hours do not count when the Preceptor is not onsite supervising the AIT.

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AIT Program Do and Don't

- Do- Personalize and customize the learning experiences to meet the individual AIT's needs.

Each person has a specific experience and education background that makes each training unique

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AIT Program Do and Don't

- Don't – Misjudge the teachable moments.

Don't always rush in to "solve" the problems the AIT has. Being able to ask the right questions to steer the AIT to finding the solution on their own is a skill every Preceptor needs.
